Isaiah?

Prophets from 3 different periods in Israel's history contributed to the writing of the Book of Isaiah.

The period covered is from 742 to 500 BCE


Themes in Isaiah include faithfulness to God, justice for the poor and hope for the future.

These themes reflect the context of the time including when the people were living in exile in Babylon. Therefore, the writer was trying to inspire the people to live in hope and to be assured of God's love and that their lives would improve.
