But despite this, our constitution, which is 122 years old, still does not recognize the unique and important contributions of the First Australians - it's time for that to change.

The Uluru Statement from the Heart is a call by Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people for real and practical change in Australia through the establishment of a constitutionally enshrined Voice to Parliament. '- Yes 23
